1 Corinthians 1:1-17... *Appeal for Unity*

God had blessed the church at Corinth, yet there were divisions between those who liked Paul's simple style and those who preferred a more sophisticated and philosophical approach. There are many things that divide people today, as well. In this lesson, Paul gives practical insights to help unite us in Christ.

There were problems in the church in Corinth, which were actually symptoms of a more serious issue - they neither understood nor lived in a manner worthy of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Paul wanted them to grasp the full truth of the gospel and to live by God's standards rather than those of the world. He pointed out the contradiction between how they were living and the truth of who they were in Jesus Christ.

One of the benefits of keeping a journal is the ability to look back and see how much you have grown in your walk with Jesus. Growing Stronger...

Jesus treated everyone, including women, with the same respect. In fact, He has done more to elevate the position of women than any other religious or world leader. Study notes for 1 Corinthians 11:1-16

1 Corinthians 11:17-34... *The Lord's Supper*

Communion in New Testament times was celebrated during a common meal or "love feast", much like our potlucks today. But the Corinthian believers were not very loving at these meals. Paul puts forth a more God-honoring way to celebrate the most sacred meal of all: the Lord's Supper.

1 Corinthians 13... *The Most Excellent Way*

It is good to desire spiritual gifts, but merely having these gifts is not the most excellent way to be a godly person. The Corinthians were proud of their spiritual gifts, but Paul reminds us that without love all other gifts are meaningless. If possible, read this chapter in the Amplified Bible.

In chapter 13, Paul established that love should motivate the use of all of the gifts of the Spirit. In this chapter, Paul focuses on the exciting potential of God-inspired speech in the Christian community. He now turns to an example of two gifts wherewith we can love with words. But for these gifts to be truly loving, they must be understood and used for the glory of God.
